CREATING CHANGE

The Arc has created real and personal change for millions with I/DD by playing an instrumental role in the development and passage of landmark legislation such as the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), an expansion of affordable housing options, and recent healthcare reform. These reforms impact everything from how schools educate children with I/DD to preventing insurance companies from denying coverage of pre-existing conditions.

SHAPING PUBLIC POLICY

A team of dedicated policy experts work at the national, state and local level to make sure that our elected and appointed leaders understand the needs, issues and concerns of people with I/DD and that federal and state laws and regulations help to promote full inclusion. The Arc's Public Policy Office

DRIVING INNOVATION

- The Autism NOW national information and resource center is specifically for individuals with autism and other developmental disabilities and their families. Funded by a grant from the Administration on Developmental Disabilities, the center's innovative Website, educational Webinars and other initiatives such as Regional Summits exploring new ideas and best practices give people with autism and those around them reliable information, new resources and opportunities to connect and share. - The School-to-Community Transition Program funded by the Walmart Foundation and other donors helps young adults transition from school to adult life in the areas of employment, post-sec-

ondary education and independent community living. This program provides direct support and services through nearly 50 chapters of The Arc researching the issues faced during transition and providing a national database to record and validate best practices.

The Arc recently conducted a landmark survey of more than 5,000 respondents to assess Family and Individual Needs for Disability Support (FINDS) to direct us in understanding gaps in supports and unmet needs.
